
## #5 Col. John Nixon and the Natural Birth vs. Jesus and Nicodemus and the Spiritual Birth

Key Understanding: The natural birth vs. the spiritual birth. The central doctrine of the Declaration of Independence, first read publicly on July 8, 1776, by Col. John Nixon, is mankind's "natural birthright" to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, a supposed "right" given to one by God at one's natural birth. This is in direct contrast and emphasis to the doctrines of Jesus Christ surrounding the spiritual birth – being 'born again' – spoken to Nicodemus in John 3:3.
