<u>#397 The First Oswald Head Wound – Richard Oswald was Britain's Chief Negotiator of the September 3, 1783, Treaty of Paris</u>

Now we come to the stout topics of <u>The First Oswald Head Wound</u> and (soon) <u>The Second</u> <u>Oswald Head Wounds</u> (plural), which relate directly to <u>The Deadly Wound of the Beast</u>, <u>Phase</u> <u>II</u>. We will be returning to <u>The Deadly Wound of the Beast</u>, <u>Phase II</u> and the Vietnam War</u>, but not until some time has passed and we have notably magnified our understandings in several other areas.

The First Oswald Head Wound


The September 3, 1783, Treaty of Paris represented the official end of the American Revolutionary War as Great Britain officially recognized American independence.



Representing Great Britain as its *chief negotiator* of what became the September 3, 1783, Treaty of Paris was wealthy merchant **Richard Oswald**. The *signer* for Great Britain of the Treaty of Paris was David Hartley.

The *negotiators* for the United States of America were Benjamin Franklin, John Jay, and John Adams, all of whom also *signed* the treaty.

Key Understanding: *Richard Oswald, the first Oswald*. The Lord ordained a man named *Oswald* to be Britain's primary negotiator of the Treaty of Paris, which officially handed Great Britain its defeat in the Revolutionary War and finalized the birth of the United States as the Scarlet Beast out of the Pit.
