#852 The Lutheran Seminary at Gettysburg – Connecting Church-ill with the Republican Party twice: (1) The January 9, 1854, Birth of Churchill's Mother and the March 20, 1854, Birth of the Republican Party, and (2) the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg and the first Republican President, Abraham Lincoln (and his Gettysburg Address)

In Unsealing #836, we covered Church-ill Republicans – Connecting Church-ill with the Republican Party: The January 9, 1854, Birth of Churchill's Mother and the March 20, 1854, Birth of the Republican Party. Then, in Unsealing #837, we transitioned directly into this series of The Lutheran Seminary at Gettysburg.

Key Understanding: Connecting church-ill with the Republican Party. The purpose of this Unsealing is to understand that through the Lutheran Seminary at Gettysburg, we again see the close connection between Church-ill and the Republican Party. The "just war" Church-ill is reflected through the Lutheran Seminary at Gettysburg, site of the beginning of the July 1-3, 1863, Battle of Gettysburg, while the Republican Party is represented through Civil War president Abraham Lincoln, who was the first Republican Party president, and who gave the Gettysburg Address on November 19, 1863.



So, we are connecting <u>Church-ill-church-ill</u> with the <u>Republican Party</u> twice:

(1) the January 9, 1854, Birth of Churchill's Mother and the March 20, 1854, Birth of the Republican Party

January 9, 1854 birth of Churchill's mother



March 20, 1854 birth of the Republican Party








(2) the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg and the first Republican Party president, Abraham Lincoln, who gave the Gettysburg Address on November 19, 1863

The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg and "just war" represent the church-ill



Abraham Lincoln and the Gettysburg Address represent the Republican Party



In other words, in this case, the phrase *Church-ill* and its meaning most definitely encompass – because of the Civil War role of the Gettysburg Lutheran Seminary – the *sword*-bearing side of the Martin Luther Protestant Reformation.

Therefore, we can add a Martin Luther/Protestant Reformation aspect to Daniel 7:21:

Daniel 7:21 (KJV) I beheld, and <u>THE SAME HORN</u> [the Daniel 7:8 Little Horn Nation of America] <u>MADE WAR WITH THE</u> [Church-ill "just war" Martin Luther/Protestant Reformation Republican Party] <u>SAINTS</u>, and prevailed against them;
