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Key Understanding: The Potomac River. Robert E. Lee's Confederate army crossed the Potomac River both going to and retreating from the Battle of Gettysburg. Not only was George Meade the general of the Army of the Potomac at the Battle of Gettysburg, but after the battle the issue of the Potomac River was significant because President Abraham Lincoln desired that Meade overtake and destroy Lee's army before it crossed the river into Virginia. The point is that the Army of the Potomac was very much connected to the Potomac River, even as a part of the story of the Battle of Gettysburg. The victorious Army of the Potomac would eventually represent America in complete victory not at Gettysburg, but at Appomattox. While ancient Egypt would rise like the Nile, America would rise like the Potomac.
