
#1338 America as Media-Persia, II – The 6-month change: John the Baptist was born five (5) to six (6) months before Jesus Christ, and fleshly traditional Christianity mixed with paganism had/has the birth of Jesus Christ occurring on December 25, with the birth of John the Baptist occurring six (6) months earlier


Jesus Christ and John the Baptist were related. Their mothers, Mary and Elizabeth, were cousins.


Key Understanding #1: Six (6) months between the births of John the Baptist and Jesus Christ. John the Baptist was born five (5) to six (6) months before Jesus Christ, but because of the way Luke 1:36 reads, it has been traditionalized by many that John the Baptist was born virtually exactly six (6) months before Jesus Christ.

Luke 1:30-38 (KJV) And the angel said unto her, Fear not, Mary: for thou hast found favour with God. 31 And, behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and shalt call his name JESUS. 32 He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest: and the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of his father David:

- 33 And he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end.
- 34 Then said Mary unto the angel, How shall this be, seeing I know not a man?







*37 For with God nothing shall be impossible.* 

38 And Mary said, Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word. And the angel departed from her.

Key Understanding #2: The births of John the Baptist and Jesus Christ became attached to the solstices. In history, pagan celebrations of the cycles of nature, such as the winter solstice and the summer solstice – which are six (6) months apart – became attached to Christianity. The December 25 winter solstice celebration of the "birth of the infant sun" became the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ, the infant Son of God, and – because John the Baptist was said to have been born six (6) months before Jesus Christ – summer solstice celebrations such as June 23 Midsummer's Eve/June 24 Midsummer's Day were also St. John's Day (St. John the Baptist's Day). St. John's Day became sacred to the Knights Templar and the Knights of St. John, the Roman Catholic crusaders of the Middle Ages.




