
The Northwest Ordinance banned slavery in the Northwest Territory. The banning of slavery in the Northwest Territory by the Northwest Ordinance effectively established the Ohio River as the boundary between free and slave territory in the region between the Appalachian Mountains and the Mississippi River. The division set the stage for the balancing act between free states and slave states that was the basis for the most critical political question in America until it was resolved by the Civil War.
