John Page and the Declaration of Independence. John Page (*pictured below left*) served as a representative from the state of Virginia in the first four U.S. Congresses (March 4, 1789-March 3, 1797), and served as Governor of Virginia from 1802-1805, while Thomas Jefferson was U.S. President. Earlier in his life, Page graduated from the College of William and Mary in 1763, where he was a friend and the closest college classmate of Thomas Jefferson. President George W. Bush introduced the closing section of his January 20, 2001, inauguration speech by saying, "After the Declaration of Independence was signed, Virginia statesman John Page wrote to

Thomas Jefferson: 'We know the race is not to the swift nor the battle to the strong. Do you not think an angel rides in the whirlwind and

Key Understanding: Since the whirlwind and storm that John Page was referring to were the Declaration of Independence/Revolutionary War against Great Britain, it is clear that when George W. Bush concluded his January 20, 2001, inauguration speech by saying, "This work continues. This story goes on. And an angel still rides in the whirlwind and directs this storm," he was referring to the idea that America would, during his presidency, continue its course with a spirit and mission similar to that which was exhibited through the Declaration of Independence/Revolutionary War, which was the spreading of America's freedom to the world.

Ecclesiastes 9:11 is clearly seen in George W. Bush's quote of John Page.

Ecclesiastes 9:11 (KJV) I returned, and saw under the sun, that the race is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong, neither yet bread to the wise, nor yet riches to men of

understanding, nor yet favour to men of skill; but time and chance happeneth to them all.

Nahum 1:3 – which is in the midst of a passage that warns of the Lord's anger against Nineveh (representing the Assyrian Empire) – is also clearly seen in George W. Bush's quote of John Page.

Nahum 1:3 (KJV) The LORD is slow to anger, and great in power, and will not at all acquit the wicked: the LORD hath his way in the whirlwind and in the storm, and the clouds are the dust of his feet.
