Key Understanding: *Princeton*. Princeton, New Jersey, and Princeton University, named after Prince William III of the House of Orange-Nassau, were ordained by the Lord to further prophetically link (i) the theme of the rise of the United States of America as the Revelation 17:08 Beast out of the Pit with (ii) the theme of that same Daniel 7:8 Little Horn-Beast (out of the Pit) eventually being given to the Daniel 7:11 burning orange flame.



William III, Prince of Orange and Nassau

Overview of Princeton. Princeton,
New Jersey, located roughly half-way
between New York and Philadelphia,
was originally named "Prince-Town"
in honor of Prince William III of
Orange and Nassau. The town of
Princeton earned its place in history for
several reasons. The Revolutionary War
Battle of Princeton in January 1777 was
a major victory for General George
Washington and his troops following
very closely on the heels of his victory
over the Hessians in Trenton in
December 1776. With this victory in
Princeton, Washington had driven most



of the British troops out of New Jersey and the prospect of total victory in the war was greatly improved.

During the summer and early fall of 1783, the U.S. Congress under the Articles of Confederation met in Princeton University's Nassau Hall and the town actually became the young nation's



capital for approximately four months. Princeton can also boast of being the home of two signers of the Declaration of Independence: Richard Stockton and John Witherspoon.

Princeton University's Nassau Hall (pictured in 1874) was completed in 1756 and named for Prince William III of Orange and Nassau. In 1776 the Declaration of Independence was read on its lawn. It suffered bombardment during the Revolutionary War. The town of Princeton became the country's capital in 1783 when the Continental Congress met in Nassau Hall between June and November. Today it is the administrative office of Princeton University which is in Mercer County, New Jersey.

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The university, originally named "The College of New Jersey" and chartered in 1746, was located in several other spots before being moved to Princeton in 1756; however the university's name was not officially changed to "Princeton" until 1896.
