

#2147 The Yom Kippur War and the Abomination of Desolation – The post-World War II U.S. waxing great toward the South and toward the East as a *second* Syria/Antiochus IV Epiphanes, part 406, **The Pale Horse, (iii), Repeat of Unsealing #786 about Woodrow Wilson’s April 2, 1917, War Message partially fulfilling Revelation 6:2**

Key Understanding: *The historical and prophetic relationship between Woodrow Wilson’s war message and the abolition of the Pale of Settlement in Russia. To better comprehend not just the *historical* significance, but also the *spiritual* and *prophetic* significance of the *double* events of April 2, 1917, of (i) Woodrow Wilson’s (pictured) message to Congress calling for a declaration of war against Germany, and (ii) Alexander Kerensky’s democratic Provisional Government in Russia passing a law that abolished the century old Pale of Settlement, *below* is a repeat of Unsealing #786.*

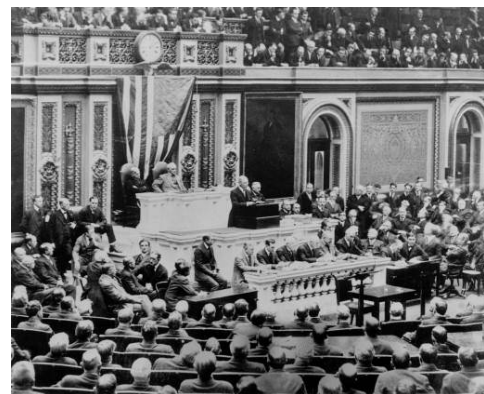


Key Understanding: *Woodrow Wilson’s April 2, 1917, war message was in fulfillment of Revelation 6:2. Woodrow Wilson’s ‘Make the World Safe for Democracy’ war message of April 2, 1917, which brought America into World War I, was a part of his fulfillment as a key Antichrist White Horse Rider of Revelation 6:2. [April 2 + 2 months = 6:2 = Revelation 6:2.]*

*Revelation 6:2 (KJV) And I saw, and behold A WHITE HORSE: and HE THAT SAT ON HIM [Woodrow Wilson on April 2, 1917 – and we can call his horse *Man o’ War*] HAD A BOW; and a crown was given unto him: and HE WENT FORTH CONQUERING, AND TO CONQUER.*

President Woodrow Wilson entered the packed and cheering chamber of the House of Representatives at 8:32 p.m., April 2, 1917. His speech would end at 9:11 p.m. Few persons in the chamber ever forgot the electric drama of that evening. The speech included . . .



Woodrow Wilson addressing Congress on April 2, 1917

“We are glad,” Wilson went on, “to fight thus for the ultimate peace of the world and for the liberation of its

peoples, the German peoples included: for the rights of nations great and small and the privilege of men everywhere to choose their way of life and obedience. **The world must be made safe for democracy.** Its peace must be planted upon the tested foundations of political liberty. We have no selfish ends to serve. We desire no conquest, no dominion. We seek no indemnities for ourselves, no material compensation for the sacrifices we shall freely make. We are but one of the champions of the rights of mankind. We shall be satisfied when those rights have been made as secure as the faith and the freedom of nations can make them.”
