

Abner Doubleday (June 26, 1819 – January 26, 1893) was a career United States Army officer and Union general in the American Civil War. He fired the first shot in defense of Fort Sumter, the opening battle of the war, and had a pivotal role in the early fighting at the Battle of Gettysburg.




Abner Doubleday (*right*) fired the first shot for the North in the Civil War, at Fort Sumter (*left*), April 12, 1861



Doubleday initially served in coastal garrisons and then in the Mexican-American War from 1846 to 1848 and the Seminole Wars from 1856 to 1858. In

1852 he married Mary Hewitt of Baltimore. In 1858 he was transferred to Fort Moultrie in Charleston harbor, but by the start of the Civil War he was a captain and second in command in the garrison at Fort Sumter, under Major Robert Anderson. He aimed the cannon that fired the first return shot in response to the Confederate bombardment of Fort Sumter on April 12, 1861. He subsequently referred to himself as the "hero of Sumter" for this role.

Key Understanding: *Doubleday and 48 hours*. The name *Doubleday* meaning *double days* became a part of Abner Doubleday's life at the Battle of Gettysburg, where, for the second time, he played a significant role in a notorious Civil War battle. Though successful at Gettysburg, Doubleday was given the nickname "Forty-eight Hours" Doubleday after being removed from command during the battle by General George Meade.
