Key Understanding #1: *The birth of Ishmael and the birth of Dan*. The Lord designed and ordained the *birth of Dan* to be a double of the *birth of Ishmael*. Abraham's and Sarah's Hagar gave birth to Ishmael, and Jacob's and Rachel's Bilhah gave birth to Dan.

Key Understanding #2: *The birth of Dan represented 'born after the flesh.'* The birth of Dan would prophetically represent what the birth of Ishmael represented – the theme of *born of the flesh.*

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Galatians 4:23 (KJV) But <u>HE WHO WAS OF THE BONDWOMAN WAS BORN AFTER</u>

THE FLESH; but he of the freewoman was by promise. [NIV . . . His son by the slave woman was born in the ordinary way; but his son by the free woman was born as the result of a promise.]

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
