"**Bes was primarily the protector of childbirth.** During the birth, Bes would dance about the room, shaking his rattle and yelling to frighten away demons that would otherwise put a curse on the child. After the child was born, Bes would stay by the cradle entertaining the child. When a baby laughed or smiled for no apparent reason, it was believed that Bes was somewhere in the room making funny faces."

Key Understanding: *Bes, the protector of childbirth at Dan.* The Lord ordained Bes – a pagan god worshipped as the protector of childbirth – to be associated with the pagan temple worship at Dan because *the <u>birth</u> of Dan himself*, following in the pattern of *the <u>birth</u> of Ishmael*, is a major part of the prophetic understanding surrounding the tribe of Dan.


