Key Understanding: *Winter soldiers*. "A *little season*" in Revelation 6:11 was represented (in the *counterfeit*) through the *winter soldiering* of the Continental Army during the Revolutionary War.

Tyranny, like hell, is not easily conquered; yet we have this consolation with us, that the harder the conflict, the more glorious the triumph.

Winter soldiers at Valley Forge. Of all the places associated with America's War for Independence, none conveys more the impression of suffering, sacrifice, and ultimate triumph than Valley Forge. No battles were fought here, no bayonet charges or artillery bombardments took place, but during the winter of 1777-1778 approximately 2,000 colonial soldiers died at hospitals in the surrounding area nonetheless. Valley Forge is the story of an army's epic struggle to survive against terrible odds, against hunger, disease, and the unrelenting forces of nature.


