
The **Major League Baseball All-Star Game**, also popularly known as the "Midsummer Classic", is an annual baseball game between players from the National League and the

American League, currently selected by a combination of fans, players, coaches, and managers. The All-Star Game usually occurs in early to mid-July and marks the symbolic halfway point in the Major League Baseball (MLB) season (though not the mathematical halfway point; in most seasons, that actually takes place one week earlier). The game is usually played on a Tuesday, with no regular season games scheduled on the day before or the day after. These are the only two calendar days of the year on which no regular or preseason games in any of the major professional sports leagues of the United States are scheduled. The other three major American sports – basketball, football, and hockey - are in their off seasons in the summer, but otherwise overlap each other frequently in the other three seasons.

**"This time it counts."** The 2002 All-Star Game was held on July 9, 2002, in Miller Park in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, home of the Milwaukee Brewers of the National League. To the embarrassment of Major League Baseball, the game ended in a 7-7 tie. As a result, baseball commissioner Bud Selig announced that starting the next year, with the 2003 All-Star

Game at the home field of the Chicago White Sox, the game would "count", with the winning league being awarded home field advantage in the World Series. "This time it counts" became a well-known catch phrase associated with the July 15, 2003, All-Star Game.

Key Understanding #1: *Counted, counted.* The Lord ordained the July 15, 2003, All-Star Game in Chicago, which occurred on the 227<sup>th</sup> [+ 11 years = 238<sup>th</sup>] birthday of the United States of America, and which pointed to America being the Second City of Babylon, or Babylon the Great, to be associated with "this time it counts" to warn America-Babylon

that just as the *first city* of Babylon was *numbered*, *numbered*, as per Daniel 5:25-5:28, so too was the Second City of Babylon *numbered*, *numbered* by God. The words *numbered*, *numbered* have as their root the words *counted*, *counted* [see Strong's Concordance #4483 and #4484 in the Old Testament].

Daniel 5:25 (KJV) And this is the writing that was written, *MENE*, *MENE*, *TEKEL*, *UPHARSIN*.



Daniel 5:26-28 (KJV) This is the interpretation of the

thing: MENE; <u>GOD HATH NUMBERED THY KINGDOM</u> [5:26 = 6:6 = 8:6], <u>AND</u> <u>FINISHED IT</u>.

27 TEKEL; Thou art weighed in the balances, and art found wanting. 28 PERES; Thy kingdom is divided, and given to the Medes and Persians.

Key Understanding #2: July 15, 2003 = July 26, 2003 = 7:26 = 5:26 = Daniel 5:26. July 15, 2003, the date of "this time it counts," points to Daniel 5:26.
